
Common Readers to Host Author

And now, best selling author William Kent Krueger will be attending USCL's August meeting of the Common Readers Book Club via Zoom to discuss his novel, *This Tender Land*.

Every year the Common Readers participants submit books suggestions for the group to vote on for the following year. Vicki Orians offered this novel for the 2022 reading list and was thrilled to hear that group leader, Krystal Smalley had contacted the publisher to invite the author to discuss his work.

The Common Readers meeting will take place on Tuesday August 16th at 6:30 p.m. in USCL's large meeting room and is open to the public. Krystal invites people to submit questions for the author regarding *This Tender Land* and encourages





Zucchini Patties

1 small zucchini, grated

1 cup bread crumbs
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/4 cup flour
1/2 tsp. onion, minced
1/2 tsp. garlic, minced
salt and pepper to taste
1/4 cup Romano cheese, grated

Mix all ingredients and form into patties. Fry. Place in serving dish and sprinkle with additional grated Romano cheese.
