- your voice and your closeness.




# Coded Storywalk

### Kids Can Cook!





# Sugar Snap Pea Salad with Sweet Lemon and Mustard Dressing

1 1/2 lb. sugar snap peas, strings removed Juice of 1 lemon

6 Tbsp. olive oil

1 Tbsp. Dijon mustard

2 tsp. granulated sugar

4 Tbsp. finely minced scallions

Salt and white pepper

Bring salted water to boil in a vegetable steamer. Add peas and simmer, covered, for 5 minutes or until crisp-tender. Run under cold water to stop further cooking and drain on paper towels. Place in serving bowl and set aside. In a small jar, combine the lemon juice, oil, mustard, and sugar. Cover tightly and shake until the mixture is smooth and blended. Add the scallions, season with salt and pepper, and pour the dressing over the peas. Cover and chill for at least 2 hours before serving.
